- **Beginning Childbirth** 6-week session meets on Thursdays from 7-9 p.m. at the Women's and Children's Hospital. Class costs \$55. Free for MO Care participants. A one-day class is offered on Saturday from 9-5 for the same cost.
- **Breastfeeding** at the Women's and Children's Hospital from 7-9 p.m. Class costs \$10. There is no charge if enrolled in Beginning Childbirth or if parent is a MO Care participant.
- **For Big Kids Only** at the Women's and Children's Hospital from 6:30-8 p.m. This free class prepares children for a new sibling.
- **Infant/Child CPR** at the Women's and Children's Hospital from 7-9 p.m. on Mondays and 9-11 a.m. on Saturdays. Class costs \$35.

Family Impact Center (FIC) provides lifelong education to improve the quality of life of individuals in the Columbia community. This is done by bringing University of Missouri programs to central Columbia, giving students the opportunity to apply what they are learning in their respective fields by providing free services to individuals in the community. - **Building Strong Families (BSF)**- free classes to help parents discover their family's strengths and learn to build on them, working with others to face challenges and meet goals. - **Lend and Learn Library** is a safe, free space for children up to age three to play with toys that promote social-emotional, cognitive, motor and language development. Toys may also be checked out to take home. A parent educator is always present in the library to answer questions about your child's development. Open Mon-Thurs, 9am-12:30pm when Columbia public schools are open. Located at the First Chance for Children office at 1010 Fay St. A 2nd free location is open year round in Centralia on Tues. & Thurs., 9am-12:30pm. Located at the Boone County Building, 1023 E Hwy 22.
- **Baby Bags and Safe Cribs** can be delivered at no cost to at-risk parents of a new baby. Baby bags include books to read to the newborn, a baby safety kit, a health kit, a bath water thermometer, a sleeper, and pamphlets about local resources. Staff also connects families with appropriate community programs including Women, Infant & Children (WIC), and Parents as Teachers +.
- **BabyU** is a home visitation program designed to help parents strengthen protective factors that help them deal with the challenges of raising children. Services include parent education through intentional home visitation, parent connection opportunities and playgroups, and incentives for program participation, including diapers, wipes, home & health items, and board books.

Healthy Families is a free home visiting program provided to Boone County residents through Columbia/Boone County Public Health and Human Services (Health Dept.). Healthy Families begins visits with pregnant women in the first or second trimester, and continues after the birth of the child until age 3 years. Home visitors provide child development and parenting information, support and encouragement to both new and experienced parents. Assistance with Medicaid for Pregnant Women, WIC, and Food Stamp applications can also be provided. Items such as cribs, car seats, and diapers may be given to families in the program. Is Your Child on Track with growth and development? Boone County Early Childhood Coalition (BCECC) will help you find out with a free developmental screening. Parents will complete the Survey of Well-being of Young Children and create an online account to save the information. This survey will assess your child's well-being with reference to developmental milestones, social-emotional health, social interactions and family context. BCECC staff will discuss results, resources, and any needed supports with each family. For Boone County families with children ages 2 to 5. La Leche League Breastfeeding Meetings offer mother-to-mother support for all mothers and pregnant mothers interested in learning more about breastfeeding.
